Most parents wonder at times if their child is growing and developing like other children the same age. If you are concerned that your child is growing or learning at a slower rate than other children, help is available through your local school district and Educational Service Unit #8. All children develop at different rates. Here are some guidelines for you to see how your child is developing:

3 years

- Jump up and down
- Begin to pedal a riding toy
- Throw a big ball and catch it
- Sort two objects that match
- Play with others and share toys sometimes
- Talk in short sentences and try to tell you what I'm feeling
- Ask what and why questions

4 years

- Talk with words in sentences that can be understood by friends and family (75% of what is said)
- Draw simple circles and stick figure people
- Match and name 3 or 4 colors
- Climb up and down a slide by myself
- Put together simple puzzles with 5 or 6 pieces
- Follow simple two step directions
- Use the toilet with just a little help

5 years

- Can dress and undress myself without much help
- Run, jump, skip, and climb with ease
- Follow three step directions
- Ask and answer who, what, when, and where questions
- Play well with others in a group
- Enjoy games and follow simple rules
- Recognize my printed name
- Name 3-6 colors
- Can count a small group of objects

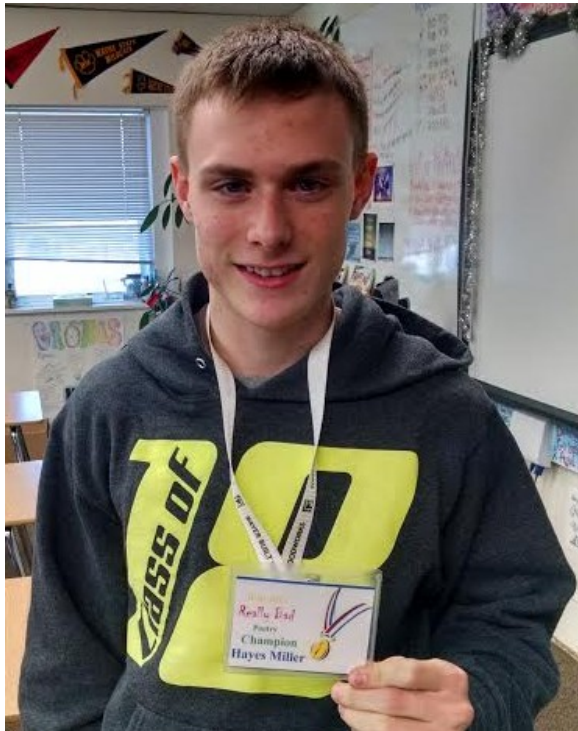
Bad Poetry Slam Champ Crowned— by Mrs. Shoe

On Friday, December 9, junior Hayes Miller was recognized as the English 11 2016-17 Bad Poetry Champion. He joins the likes of other “distinguished” EPS poets (Kenny Bush, Elianne Heilhecker, and Alois Warner) in the EPS Literary Hall of Shame.

The annual contest occurs at the conclusion of the early American literature unit. The unit focuses on Puritan literature, primarily historical narratives, sermons and, well, poetry. Though this genre did not play a tremendous role at the time, some did exist.

After spending a good portion of time writing their best poetry in previous years, the students are challenged to write a bad poem—a poem utterly painful to the ears. They must follow specific guidelines in order to demonstrate their understanding of Puritan poetry, their mastery of assorted poetic devices, and their grasp of new vocabulary.

Upon completing their Master—or better yet—“Minorpieces,” the students deliver their poems in slam format. Three to four unsuspecting celebrity judges are roped into the task of ranking the poets on a scale from 1-10. Hayes emerged as the victor this year. Congratulations to all of our poets on a job well done . . . or shall I say “poorly done.”

Graphing Invasion!

Graphing has invaded the high school math department. Algebra I students are solving systems of equations by graphing. Geometry students have been using coordinate geometry to show that segments are parallel, perpendicular, congruent. Advanced Algebra made scatter plots to determine a line of best fit for non-linear data. Calculus students have been calculating slopes of curves at a point, and have been using graphs to help visualize this concept. College Algebra students are learning about and graphing conic sections. Technology has helped reduce the time needed to complete these tasks. The students enjoy working with the TI graphing calculators as well as Desmos, an online graphing app.

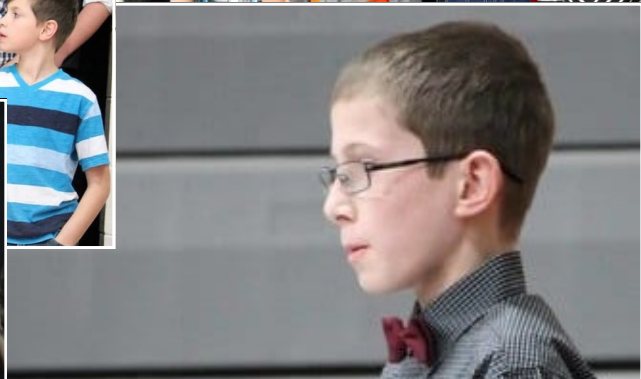

Look2College and Careers

The first semester is over, and it is a good time to evaluate progress made on your journey (or your child's journey) to college.

At EPS, the conversation starts as early as 3rd grade, as we will begin career exploration next semester as part of elementary guidance. We revisit careers again in 6th grade, utilizing Education-Quest's new curriculum resource *Look2College*. We start to look at the differences between associates and bachelor degrees, and we use **MyNextMove.org**, which is a website that has students take a career interest survey that then explores careers of interest. *Look2College* also fosters good conversations about what's important for students to know about if they want to pursue college as part of their journey to their career choice: solid study skill habits, strength in character, and investing in themselves.

In 8th grade, students take an Exploratory Careers course, starting in January. In this course, students use **NebraskaCareerConnections.org** to delve deeper in to skills, interests, and values of a variety of career pathways. A college connection for 8th graders is *KnowHow 2Go*. This resource provides a good check list of steps for 8th graders as well as 9th and 10th graders to follow:

Sign up for *Countdown2College* which is a monthly college planning email from EducationQuest. It revisits importance of taking challenging courses especially to help on ACT, working hard to get good grades and GPA, and getting involved in extracurricular activities.
